IS ILLINOIS DRYING UP?

A survey of Illinois recently made public by the Illinois Liquor Control Commission revealed that 171 cities, towns and villages, 180 townships and road districts in the state, and 114 precincts and parts of precincts in Chicago have been voted wholly or partially dry in local-option elections since 1934, the Chicago Daily News reports.

Only eighteen out of 102 counties are entirely wet, while portions of eighty-four counties have voted dry in the last four years, it was revealed. Eight precincts in Chicago went dry in November, 1938, and seven more voted in local option elections in April. Alfred S. Smith, chairman of the commission, said he recognized a growing dry sentiment.— Union Signal.

ALCOHOL JUSTICE

A Boston judge recently acquitted a motorist on a charge of manslaughter because "he was so drunk he was not in a position to form a judgment or exercise his will." The accused had caused two deaths when his car struck and killed a man and his little two-year-old son. This example of judicial wisdom has naturally aroused a storm of protest. As Professor Samuel B. Warner of Harvard said, the logic of this decision "would seem to be that if one must drive recklessly, let him by all means become completely intoxicated first, to avoid a conviction for manslaughter."
