They all trembled under the responsibility laid on them. It might cost the lives of those going and again if they failed to fully get God's mind His perefect plan would be marred.

How precious is that hour when the Holy Ghost assures all who know Him that such steps are divinely ordered. God never plans a failure. He plans success even if it costs suffering, privation, isolation, tears and death.

They "laid their hands on them." These were the leaders of the home bands. By this act they were declaring that the home bands were now convinced by the Spirit that they were sharing the responsibility of the call. The Bible says, "They sent them away," but they were only obeying divine orders so in reality they were "being sent forth by the Holy Ghost."
