### IT IS LARGELY A MATTER OF WILL

"On my arrival from China," wrote a missionary, "I received a letter asking me to call and see an invalid. I knew he was blind, but I was not prepared to see what I did see.

"He was lying upon the bed; every joint in his body was immovable—unable to turn in any direction. His jaw was locked, so that it necessitated the removal of his front teeth to insert the spout of his feeding cup. His whole body was as stiff as a log of wood, but his mind was full of grace of service.

"For twenty-nine years he has lain thus, fed only on liquid foods. For twenty-two years he has been blind. Is it possible that such an one as he could do anything to help others?

"Listen! Seventeen blind children are supported by his efforts in India; ten in China; a blind Bible woman in Korea; a blind boy in the Sudan; a blind boy in Fiji; a blind Bible woman in Jaffa. Three hundred pounds a year is received in answer to prayer by that faithful, sightless, silent paralyzed disciple in that little shutin room in Melbourne."—Selected.
