A quiet, loving husband who, always thoughtful and kind to his wife and children, becomes like a raging beast when drunk till, at the sound of his footsteps, his loved ones flee the home until its effects are slept off.

Dorchester today holds many criminals incarcerated there who committed murder and other crimes when under the influence of drink and now are serving out their time for things they never would have done only they were drunk.

Visit a jail. Ask the fifteen or twenty men why they were there and probably three-quarters of them or more, will tell you "through drink"; at least that was so at the Amherst jail I visited last Friday, bound by habit and kept in jail because of drink when God made man to be a king instead of a slave.

"He that loveth pleasure shall be a poor man and he that loveth wine and oil shall not be rich."—Prov. 21:17. Pleasure and strong drink go together and poverty dogs their footsteps.

The liquor trade is a fierce competitor for the consumer's dollar and diverts into its own coffers spending money which should go into the home and into gainful industry."

In Amherst last year our liquor store took in \$133,000 and at the same time there were 400 families on relief. If that much money could have been spent on those 400 families they could have lived in comfort and not needed to have relief.
