Following I am giving you a short account of my colporteur work for the British and Foreign Bible Society in New Brunswick during the past summer and fall, five months in all. I commenced work June 1st and worked and visited the following places in the Counties of York and Northumberland. From Fredericton I worked through Devon, Nashwaak, Nashwaak, Douglass, Mouth of Keswick, Keswick Ridge, Macnaquac, Lower and Upper Queensbury, Bead Island, Lower Hainesville, Wiggins Mills, Zealand, Stone Ridge from Marysville to Durham Bridge, Lower and Upper Durham, Penniac, Mount Hope, Kilnary Road, Hilltop avenue (Colored people), Taymouth Section, Zionville, Wellington, Stanley Section, Glen Road, Tay Falls, Lime Kiln, Pleasant Valley, Nashwaak Bridge, Ward Settlement, Cross Creek Station Section and

village, Williamsburg, Woodland, Royal Road, North-Cardigan settlement, North Tay Road, Tay Creek Settlement, Fredericksburg, Currysburg, Upper Williamsburg, Napadogan, Green Hill, Maple Grove and Maple Grove Station, Parker's Ridge, Taxes River Road, Boiestown section, Gordonsville, Upper and Lower Hayesville, Upper and Lower Holtville, Bloomfield, Cambridge, Chipman, North and South Portage, Avery, McGivney, Astle, Ludlow, Price Sett., Porter Cove, New Bandon, (Betts Mill, new settlement), McNamee, Carroll's Crossing, Nelson Hollow, North Road, Doaktown, Hazelton, (back road of new settlers), (Storytown and new settlers back road), Blissfield, Upper and Lower Blackville, Coughlins, Grey and White Rapids, Upper and Lower Underhill, (Cains Settlement), Barnettville, Renous, Quarryville, Derby and Upper and Lower Derby, Millerton, Williamstown, Wilson Point, Cassilis, Indian Gardens Settlement, Red Bank, Bridgetown, Strathadam, Whitneyville, Northwest Miramichi, Boom Road, Back Road Settlement, McLean Road, Sunny Corner, (Warwick Road, new settlers), Southwest Branch Miramichi, South Esk, North Esk, (Sillikers, Upper and Lower), Lyttleton, Halcombe, Elmoor, Wildcat Settlement, on the Northwest Miramichi, Curveton, Sevogle, Lumsten, English Settlement, Chaplin Island Road, Douglastown, Ferry Road, Mill Bank, Russellville, Bartibogue Bridge, Burnt Church Settlement, Church River Road, (Lagaryville (French), New Jersey, Doyles Brook, Kirkwood, MacKinleyville, Upper and Lower Nelson, Chelmsford, Newcastle and vicinity, Maple Glen, Curtis, Sugary, (new settlers, a new road), Neguac, Simpson Point, Stymiest, Price Settlement, Cains Point, Red Pines, Tabusintac, Gaythorne, Wishart's Point, Douglassfield, Brown Road, also Kierstead Mountain!, Belleisle Creek, Springfield, Grant, Henderson Settlement. These last five places I called at on my way through home from Northumberland County. I also conducted a Bible stand as usual for 12 days at Beulah Camp meeting and at the Beulah Camp I sold more scripture than any other previous year. All my sales and distribution of scripture were exceptionally good for 5 months work. At many homes my reception was very very good as "Oh, are you selling Bibles? Come in; we do want to get a Bible." At one place I drove over two miles to an out of the way farm house. The man of the house met me in the yard. He said, I heard you were around selling Bibles. I was afraid you would not get around to see us. "Come in; we want a Bible." They bought two Bibles; and many many other interesting cases too numerous to mention. I found 38 protestant homes so-called without any Bible or Testament. Following is a statement of calls made and scripture sold: I made 4,815 visits or calls. Sold 797 Bible, 927 Testaments. Sold 4,520 portions of scripture, also 10 Testaments and 46 Gospels in the French language, and in Free Distribution to poor and destitute families and poor children I gave 53 Bible, 10 Testaments and 218 Gospels, making a total of 6,581 pieces of scripture distributed.

The distributing of God's Word is a great work and owned and blessed of God. Bible Colporteurs in many places these days in many parts of the world are receiving great opposition and many cases imprisonment. We know that His Word shall not return void, and the many letters I receive from folk I

have given or sold a Bible, Testament or even one of Gospels is proof that this work is not in vain. "The Bible is a treasure. It contains enough to make us rich for time and eternity. It contains the key of heaven. It contains the title, deeds of an inheritance incorruptible, that fadeth not away."
