F. T. Kimball passed away at his home on June 1st in Fort Fairfield, Maine, after an illness of several weeks. During his last sickness his testimony was clear and definite. The departing of Brother Kimball leaves a vacancy in our church hard to be filled. He was a charter member of the Reformed Baptist Church of Fort Fairfield, for which he was largely responsible for building. He had been a deacon for many years, an office he filled efficiently. He was 81 years old.

The funeral service was conducted by the writer assisted by Rev. F. T. Wright. The service was held at the R. B. Church on Sunday afternoon, June 2. The large crowd in attendance and the beautiful flowers showed the high esteem in which he was held.
