A testimony meeting followed. On Friday p. m. at 3 o'clock, a social service was led by Lic. Wilton Marston, reading Mark 6:30-48, and using as a text: Luke 6:49. Subject, Prayer. A season of prayer followed.

On Friday evening Rev. H. E. Mullen was the speaker, reading Psalm 103. His text was from Songs of Solomon 5:16: "This is my Friend."

On Saturday a. m. 10.30, a social service was led by Brother Ziba Orser. In the p. m. at 2.30 the business session was held.

Officers elected for ensuing quarter: Pres., L. T. Sabine Vice Pres., E. R. Watson; Secy., H. C. Mullen; Treas., of Woodstock Church; Highway Agent, P. J. Trafton. Verbal reports from the following churches were read: Royalton, Fredericton, Woodstock, Meductic, Victoria, Marysville, Fort Fairfield, Millville and Maple Ridge. These reports all contained a note of hope and encouragement. A lengthy discussion re the liquor question ending in a resolution that a resolution be forwarded to the Premier of N. B. and Canada. Revs. Dunlop, Trafton and H. E. Mullen were named a committee to draft said resolution.

A motion was made and passed thanking the church at Woodstock for kind entertainment of the Quarterly. The matter of the next Quarterly was voted to be left in the hands of the President and Secretary. Meeting adjourned.

HITLER'S CRIMES

Following is a list of the tragedies of one day, November 10th, 1938, as reported in the papers.

Ten thousand Jewish stores in ruin.

Between twenty-five and thirty synagogues dynamited and burned to the ground.

Fifty Jews in Vienna alone attempted suicide in utter despair.

Two Jews shot down in cold blood.

Whole blocks of the finest shopping districts in Munich, Berlin and Vienna looted and burned, just because they were Jewish-operated.

Thousands of Jews arrested without charge and thrown into prison.

Scores of Jews beaten unmercifully and kicked about the streets while police and people looked, adding their jeers.

All Jews ordered to leave Munich within forty-eight hours.

150,000 Jews deprived of their living and forced to live on the charity of their fellow Jews.—Brethren Herald.
