Confidence and peace are ours as an experience, which no surrounding circumstances can take from us, so long as we keep in Divine order. Though evil influences have gathered humanity in mass, working destruction one upon the other, while the prince of darkness glories in his success, we have as our leader the Prince of Peace.

Before I left Canada I pictured a group of young Zulus, similar to our fine Y. P. group at home. So, my fellow Christians, let us pray especially for this branch of the Missionary work. There are many children and young people throughout our work; but the number who have a real experience is not near what it should be.

Sunday night I returned from our Altona Quarterly on horse-back by moonlight. Down the steep rocky hillsides and across the valleys, over several small streams and then the larger Pongola river; along the sandy garden lands which lie between the lower end of the hills and the winding Pongola river. More small hills and valleys and small river crossings; then up a steady and fairly steep climb to the top of a large hill. More level stretches, several more river crossings, and finally home again. As I rode along, under and between the wild trees, I could hear the whistle of the night-hawk and the chirping of crickets; otherwise my trip was rather quiet except for the clatter of my horse's hoofs and the sound of my own voice or whistle. It is our spring-time and the plant life is bursting forth into life again.

The Altona meetings were quite well attended, and a time of blessing. Saturday we had a day of fasting, up to the evening meal. We were uniting, to ask for the mighty workings of the power of God to break down the walls that seem to be preventing the coming of the long desired revival. Let us continue to march about the walls of Jericho by prayer for this work, and not tire till the time comes for us all to shout the victor's cry: when the walls will fall and the victory be won.

Let us continue to prepare, and be ready to meet the challenge of our circumstances, in this our day.

C. Y. H. A. AFFILIATION

Across Canada rings a call to all the Y. P. Societies of holiness churches to become auxiliary to the Canadian Youth Holiness Association. It is a call to share in the efforts of this organization, and also have a part in the benefits that that group shall endeavour to

bring to the young people loyal to the holiness. cause.

At the Ottawa Convention it was officially decided by the executive of the C. Y. H. A., that this Dominion-wide effort should be made. Affiliation with the C. Y. H. A. is based on the following simple plan: (1) Each Society is requested to pay a membership fee of \$1.00 per year. (2) The payment of this fee will first. be recognized by the C. Y. H. A. by the forwarding to the affiliating Society of a membership card, which will stand as the official sign of that society's affiliation. (3) Further benefits to the Society will be received as follows: Seventy-five per cent of the fee contributed will be used to provide material and information that will be inspirational and practical to the work of your Y. P. Group. The other twenty-five per cent of this fee will be spent to forward the work of the C. Y. H. A. in respect to its progress and enlargement. Thus membership will bring specific benefit to the Society, and will also make it a part of the new enterprise which has such great possibilities in respect to enlarging and intensifying the work of holiness in this land of ours.

The following societies of our R. B. Young People's Association have paid their fee for this year: Seal Cove, Fredericton, Moncton, Victoria Corner, Amherst, Westchester, and Havelock. Some of these groups made their payment previous to this year, but, since the effort only becomes Dominion-wide now, their membership will date from Sept. 1st of this present year. It is our sincere hope, that our Reformed Baptist Y. P. Societies will be' "solid" in their support of this worthy enterprise, and that every group will affiliate actively with the C. Y. H. A.
