The language of the consecrated believer, as Fenelon puts it, is thus:

"I leave myself, O my God, in Thy hands; turn about this clay, turn it this way and that; give it a form, then break it to pieces; it is Thine; it has nothing to say; it is enough that it answers all Thy purposes, and that nothing resisteth Thy good pleasure, for which I am made. Demand, enjoin, forbid; what wilt Thou have me to bear? Exalted, abased, comforted, suffering, employed in Thy work, useless in everything; I shall ever adore Thee equally, by sacrificing all self-will to Thine. I have nothing left, but in all things to say with Mary (Luke 1:38), 'Be it unto me according to thy word.'"

THE WHOLE FAMILY

The thought of a holy family has occupied a large place in God's mind, as is revealed in His Word. God placed His own image within the heart and mind of Adam and Eve.
