Greetings again from your Home Mission workers.

The many expressions of appreciation and interest relative to our former letters make us grateful we have written, and urge us to write this final item concerning our itinerary work.

At the time of our last writing we were anticipating our meeting with the churches at Amherst. We began our campaign there on Easter Sunday and continued over May 4th, a four-Sunday series. Attendance at these services was below what it should have been for a community like Amherst, but the Lord again manifested his interest in the efforts of the few. The blessing of God attended the Word and quite a number of backsliders were restored. While at Amherst we were hospitably entertained by Brother and Sister Grant, Dr. and Mrs. Sanders, and we shall ever remember their kindness.

Leaving Amherst May 5th we travelled via Truro, where we spent a few days at Mrs. Cochrane's home, to Wood's Harbour to campaign for souls with Brother and Sister Price and the good people of our church there. I was glad for the privilege of ministering here, as my associations with the begin-

ning of this work under Brothers F. A. Dunlop, H. E. Mullen and others gave me special interest in it. We were delighted to find a beautiful little church here, erected during Brother Symonds' ministry, and the work both at Wood's and Shag Harbour prospering under the faithful ministry of their new pastor and wife.
