A short account of the work here at the present time might be of interest to you. We have just closed an evangelistic campaign which began Nov. 16th continuing to Dec. 4th inclusive. Our evangelist was Rev. Robert J. Dixon, A. M. D. D., of Everett, Mass., who has been pastor, evangelist and teacher during his ministry. For the past few years he has been teaching philosophy at Eastern Nazarene College, but resigned to again take up evangelism. He had been recommended to us as a deeply spiritual man, and sound in the doctrines which we as a denomination hold, including entire sanctification as a second definite work of grace, and he rang true on the ethics of holiness. He was from first to last a Bible preacher. He came to us in the fullness of the blessing of the gospel of Christ, and his word was with power and in demonstration of the Spirit of God. There were times when great conviction was on the people, the largest number at the altar at any one time was twenty-one. The young people responded to the truth and came to the altar seeking to be reclaimed, converted or sanctified. The congregations were good during the entire meeting. We had three preaching services on Sunday, a half hour of prayer each evening before the regular service and a great many spent a half hour during each day in secret prayer. There was a beautiful spirit of fellowship between the evangelist and pastor from the beginning to end. The church got a real lift. On Sunday night. Dec. 7th, I baptized 5 young people. We did not see all accomplished that we hoped for, but those who walked in the light were blessed. Praise the Lord. We are fully determined by the help of God to keep the glory on our soul, and preach definite second blessing holiness as our fathers did. Keep on praying.

It is a sad thing to see the children in our services manifesting concern and a desire for salvation, while their parents stay at home and show neither concern nor favor. I suppose it has always been like this, even though it seems unusual. However, these discouraging features only make us appreciate more the faithful few who are "instant in season and out of season."
