RESOLUTIONS PASSED IN THE ALLIANCE

1. Resolved that we adopt a uniform system for financing our churches.

2. Resolved that we adopt a minimum salary of not less than five hundred dollars for our ministers.

Recommendations brought in by committee and adopted:

Whereas, for several years there has been a growing conviction among us that a more satisfactory and equitable system for financing our church work should be adopted, and whereas some of our churches have already put into operation a plan which is working very satisfactorily to pastor and people alike, and whereas we believe that a more unified system would contribute much to the success of the whole work of God.

Therefore, we the Alliance of the Reformed Baptist Church, convened at Beulah Camp, recommend to our churches:

1. That we adopt the system of Storehouse Tithing, which system we understand to mean the placing of the whole tithe into the Church Treasury, through any or all the different branches of the local church.

2. That a Finance Committee be appointed by each church, including the Pastor and Treasurer, who shall recommend to the church ways by which all monies received shall be expended.

3. That each pastor be given a stated salary as may be agreed upon by church and pastor.

4. That pastors give credit to the church for produce, fuel, groceries, etc., donated by the pastorate.

5. We also urge that the church or circuit adopt the sum of \$500.00 as the minimum for pastors' salaries yearly.

Further suggestions brought in by Committee:

Your committee for bringing in further suggestions regarding a financial plan for our churches, submit the following:

1. We urge our churches to recognize the advisability of the plan and to co-operate whole-heartedly with our pastors in putting it into operation.

2. That publicity be given the plan through the Highway, to include the resolutions already passed by the Alliance, and write ups by the brethren.

3. That the third Sunday in September, 1941, be the date for bringing the matter definitely before our churches.
