It was beautiful, with lovely ferns and wild flowers that had never been disturbed and the towering trees and the Saint John River so peacefully flowing by. It made a picture never to be forgotten, and is still in my memory.

In the years since that time the Lord has permitted me to gather at our "Annual Meeting" every year but three, including this year.

It has been a wonderful privilege to listen to the messages from the evangelist and our pastors as they proclaim the doctrine of full salvation.

Many changes have taken place since 1894; those who were the "Standard Bearers" at that time are gone to their reward, but the torch they held high, has been taken up by younger men who have been true to the doctrine of Holiness and the two works of grace. It can truly be said that thousands have knelt at the altar and received an experience that has held them true to God.

For the Lord shall be thy confidence, and shall keep thy foot from being taken."
