Dear Brother:

You will think you have a regular correspondent. We are glad to say we are now receiving the Highway regularly and appreciate it.

I am writing you now concerning another matter. Since we have several hundred young men from our homes now serving in the Canadian forces we have tried to get some representation on the chaplain staff. This is a rather difficult matter because of the small number of our membership. Our method of receiving members on profession of faith only naturally makes our enrollment small. This is true of all holiness bodies. (However we have prospects of getting one of our men on the chaplain staff now soon we hope, Rev. J. F. Gregory of Toronto.)

While in Ottawa recently we were able to have a conference with Bishop Wells, the Principal Chaplain, and he went into the problem of meeting the applications of many bodies much larger than ours. He showed me how he had grouped the various bodies into about ten groups. For instance we are with the United Church and I think you are with the Baptists. Then some of the holiness bodies are with the Pentecostals, the Plymouth Brethren, the Mormons, etc.

We may have arrived at this fortunate arrangement because Mr. Matsuoka, a late premier, was a member of our church.

Brother Cooke, Supt. of the Holiness Movement Church, is much interested in this proposition and is taking the matter up with the Gospel Workers (Gough work). You might discuss it with your brethren and we will trust if some such step should be considered favorably we may be divinely guided.
