## Hartland, M. S.

#### Dear Friends:

Greetings from the land of sunshine and darkness: We have much beautiful sunshine in both summer and winter out here; also the long effects of heathenism make this a place of darkness. Thank God for the Prince of Light who lives in the hearts of the saved heathen and shines out to those benighted souls around them.

When one considers circumstances, things seem impossible; but if we spend a little time with God in prayer we see things in a new light: we begin to see things from God's point of view, the God with whom nothing is impossible. Then we reach the place where "all things are possible to him that believeth." And that is the place I am trying to reach.

God gave us a good service this afternoon; it was held in the old house in the large dining and sitting room. We had a fire in the fireplace as it was cold and damp outside. There has been a cold drizzle for a day or two. There were not very many present, but the message from Matthew 25 seemed to reach our hearts with new light and force. How necessary it is for us to have the oil, to be good and faithful. and to have a life filled with Christlike acts: to our fellow men.

There are two special meetings that I have attended recently. Southwest from Hartland about seven miles, we had a service that was rather unusual in that it was mainly concerned with children: the message and the testimonies were about children; and there were nine little ones presented, for Divine blessing, and church assistance to help them become Christians. This goodly number of children being presented seemed to be a good sign for this section: as it has been one of our hardest, since I have been back to this work. The second service was one of much prayer. In the opposite direction, and about three or more miles from here. It began with a night of prayer, preaching and testimony. We were not disappointed for the Spirit gave us special liberty in prayer for this Missionary work we are in. It always makes me feel better after we have a season of prayer like this. I feel assured that something is really accomplished. The prayer meeting lasted till about 2 o'clock in the morning; then we retired for a little sleep. The following day was Sunday, and the early afternoon meeting was blessed of God in a special way. Naturally that is what one would expect after the season of prayer of the previous night. Springtime is here and the trees and grass are rapidly throwing off their dark winter garments and putting on their beautiful green summer dress. It reminds us of how the children of God shall be changed, when mortality shall be swallowed up of life and this corruptible shall put on incorruption. Recently I dreamed of that song that speaks of the time: "When the Saints Come Marching In." What a great day that will be.

## ZULUS

Some may be interested to know how we spent Christmas in Africa after Dr. Sanders and family left for furlough years ago.

Early in the morning, young men came to the Mission Station, bringing goats for the feast; they killed and dressed these while the girls kept fires burning under the great iron pots of water; the meat was cut ready for cooking and every part went into the potsbones were not even left for the hungry dogs. The girls cooked stamped mealies (corn), also some corn porridge.

While these were cooking, they would go home to dress for the grand occasion.

Services were held for hours, preaching, testifying and hymn singing, and such joyful singing would do one's heart good to hear.

It may be the feast would not begin until 4 o'clock, then the young people would serve the different circles sitting on the ground, old men, young men and boys; old women, young women and children. If I remember correctly, there was a different part of the goat for each group of people.

And although many of them had eaten nothing that day in anticipation of the feast all would sit with folded arms and would bow their heads while grace was being said.

Then leisurely (it was not mannerly to hurry) one would take a piece of meat, take a bite and pass to the one sitting nearest until it was consumed; when it came to the porridge the women and children dipped in their fingers to eat, while the men and larger boys ate with wooden spoons.

By the way, the goat's nead was for the small boys, with the eyes protruding and wool on top.

As I visited each group wishing them a happy Christmas, those boys said Nkosikasi, it is sweet indeed-I wondered how it could be so. After the feast they would say, Kisimosi, Kisimosi, their way of asking for a gift. We would have penny boxes of matches, some salt or a little sugar for them, at other times there were book bags, which the Mission Bands had sent from Canada, all of which delighted them very much.
