EDITORIAL

THE ABNORMALTIES OF WAR

The earth is the Lord's, and the fullness thereof; the world and they that dwell therein. For he hath founded it upon the seas, and established it upon the floods. Psa. 24-1:2.

The Psalmist would have us understand that the enemy, the evil one, the devil, has no legitimate claims upon this world or the people who live in it. He says: it is the Lord's and also the people who live in it. God created the universe and all things therein: And when man sinned and lost his standing with the creator, and was disinherited and cast out by justice, God's mercy provided a way of redemption. So we are God's by right of creation and redemption. Whatever claims the evil one has are usurped. He has no right to this world or any creature that God has made. He would like to have us think that he has rights here, and that people are his: You remember, he told our Lord that the kingdoms of the world belonged to him, and said he would give them to Jesus if he would fall down and worship the evil one. But our Lord knew better, and satan did not deceive Him by that temptation. Satan would have us all worshipping him, and his works if he could make us think that he owns all things in this world.

And I fear that he is far too successful in his efforts in deceiving men, and they sometimes support the works of the devil and regard many of them as essential to our welfare in this present life.

The liquor business, the moving picture business and many forms of amusement are, doubtless works of the devil, and multitudes, and many of them church-members, are supporting and praising these things, and thus worshipping his works, if not the evil one who is responsible for them. And through them he is destroying many lives and damning immortal souls, and polluting hell.

It is true that this world is in an abnormal condition. That is, it is not functioning according to norm, not according to authoritative standard, or plan. The Creator doubtless had a plan in mind, which He has revealed to His people through His word, and by this plan this world and the inhabitants thereof, could have functioned successfully; and the joys of Eden would have continued world without end, had men lived according to God's law. Sin which is the violation of His law has thrown this world into confusion and the result is trouble,

sorrows, burdens, heartaches, strife, suicides, murders, etc., etc.

War is, and always has been, one of the outstanding evidences of a world running amuck, No doubt God's plan for men before the foundation of the world was, that they should live peaceable with each other.

In teachings of Jesus and the apostles, peace is emphasized as the basic element of happiness for all men. Note how often they used the term Peace in their salutations and benedictions. "The peace of God which passeth all understanding keep your hearts and minds through Christ Jesus." "My Peace I leave with you, My Peace I give unto you." Jesus!

One of the abnormal things about war is it takes away man's liberty. He cannot choose his own vocation; he must be a soldier, and fight, no matter how much he prefers some other occupation, or how much more money he could earn at s omething else; he belongs to the government in times of war, and must fight.

The same condition applies to many of our women and girls: Because of this present war great numbers of them are living abnormal lives, doing men's work, and filling positions which only men should fill. The Creator who made woman, has fitted her for special kinds of work which man cannot do. He has a place for her in the human family, where she can be a success and blessing. That place, saith the inspired apostle is the Home.

Multitudes are being lured away from their God-appointed place, into some kind of war work, looking for larger remuneration, and the thrill of something new, and we fear that many will be spoiled, and unfit to be homemakers, and thus the world and future generations will suffer a great loss, because of this abnormal condition caused by the war. May God have mercy on us and help us.
