My heart has often gone out to the preacher's wife. It seems so much is expected of her Too much! First I would like to express some things she should be, and then some things not to expect her to be.

1. She must be spiritual.

- 2. She must keep the blessing of God upon her soul. She will come in contact with the unsanctified, the backslidden and the sinner. - 4. Don't take it out on the preacher's wife if the sermon hits you. She can't help it.
- 5. Don't expect the calling to be onesided. Make a cheery visit to the parsonage once in a while and give a word of encouragement.

(Note: But don't come so often or stay so long that you are a nuisance and hinder rather than help the pastor and his wife in doing their work.—Editor).
