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#### **EDITORIAL**

## GOD'S PRICE FOR A REVIVAL

If my people which are called by my name shall humble themselves and pray, and seek my face, and turn from their wicked ways; then will I hear from heaven, and will forgive their sins, and will heal their land. 11 Chron. 7:14.

As truly as men have a price on things of, value, so that if others get them they must pay the price for them, so it seems that our God has set a price on spiritual blessings, and has made this fact very clear in His word, that if mankind will enjoy these blessings, he must pay God's price. For example, He says, if we confess our sins, He is faithful and just to forgive us our sins, and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness. 1 John 1:9.

So, God's price which we must pay for forgiveness and cleansing of sins is confession of the same on our part. Again, if we would prove, or know, what is God's good, acceptable, and perfect will, the inspired apostle writes, I beseech you brethren to present your bodies a living sacrifice, holy acceptable to God. Rom. 12:1, or in other words God's price to us for knowing or experiencing His perfect will, which is holiness, or sanctification, is a presentation of our bodies, ourselves, in entire consecration to Him. Furthermore let us remember that it will be vain or futile for any soul to try to get saved or to get to Heaven on any other condition, or for any other price than that which God has put on salvation, for inasmuch as salvation is possible to all so God's price for it, is within the reach of all which is repentance, followed by confession and forsaking of sin, consecration, of our all to Him and faith in God's mercy, goodness, and ability to save us; These things everyone can do and must do as individuals to be saved. In the words of our text as the heading of this article; God seems to put a price on revivals. When we say revivals we mean more than ten days, or two or three weeks of special meetings with preaching by a special evangelist, which very often result in getting a few more people coming to church while the special effort is on, and getting a few souls forward for prayer, and perhaps having two or three baptized and unite with the church and call it a revival, and say "eternity alone will reveal the good that was done." In saying these things we are not "despising the day of small things", for we realize, as is often said that "one soul saved is worth more than this world". So it is better to continue our special evangelistic effort if we do get only a

few saved. But the danger that this writer sees with much of our special effort is, we are becoming too easily satisfied with our effort and results.

It is very obvious to all who read religious literature, that we are not having revivals like this country experienced in the 18th and 19th centuries, like we had in the days of the Wesleys, Finney, Moody, Roberts, Whitefield, Edwards and others in the past years; And many are saying that the days of such revivals are past, and many churches make no effort at all to have revivals or get souls saved from their sins.

Many modern churches do have decision days, and passion week meetings, and a baptism and church joining time at Easter, when they get al! the young people of their congregations to unite with the so-called church; but that is only a way they have of increasing their membership and mighty few if any are born again or come to know anything about the power of God's grace to save them. Because they give no evidence of a changed heart and life. They continue on in the same sins, and worldly amusements which they practised before they were baptized, which is the proof that these deceived souls were not converted, for the scriptures plainly declare that "If any man be in Christ, he is a new creature, old things are passed away, behold all things are become new." 11 Cor. 5:17. The revivals that the Baptist and Methodist, and some other churches had half a century, and more ago, were held at any time of the year, and whole communities for many miles around were stirred; many people both old and young came out confessed publicly their desire to be saved, asked the people to pray for them, while they confessed their sins to God, and to their fellowmen, made restitution for wrong doing, wept and prayed through to victory, and peace came to their hearts. And the whole community for many miles around knew that a revival was in progress because of the changes that came to many hearts and homes. Family altars were erected, and worship established in the homes, people attended the old-fashioned prayer meetings and told how God had saved them. Many prayed through in the old Methodist churches especially, where the Wesleyan and scriptural doctrine of entire sanctification was preached, and found the experience of heart holiness, and shouted, laughed, cried and praised God for full salvation. Just like folk do today when they get blessed. Some were called shouting Methodists. Strong men wept over their sins, and went from house to house confessing their faults one to another; Old neighborhood quarrels of long standing were peaceably settled and people became friends again. and there was great joy in that city, as there was in Samaria following that revival under Philip. After these revivals, barrooms, brothels and many dance halls were closed, because those who kept them were converted or there were not enough unsaved people left in the community to patronize them.

### QUARTERLY MEETING
