There are four steps to a man's downfall, but they are successive and the three final ones cannot be overtaken until the first is taken. Here they are:—1. Attention. 2. Consideration. 3. Gratification. 4. Humiliation.

HOW WAR PROHIBITION WOULD AID EFFICIENCY

1. It would stop the colossal waste of more than \$4,000,000,000 annually spent for liquors. This sum invested in Defense Stamps and Bonds would pay for the building of 10 capital ships, 100 large destroyers, and 5,000 fourmotored bombing planes every year!

2. It would prevent the diversion of important food materials into liquor making.

3. It would stop the waste of transportation facilities in our own country, and to foreign ports at a time when every square foot of space is desperately needed for food and war materials for ourselves and our allies.

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4. It would advance the efficiency of our armed forces by removing the deteriorating effect of liquor selling within and without our military camps.

5. It would prevent the further alcoholic deterioration of our man-power in industry, and thus increase the production of war materials.

6. It would be a potent factor in the prevention of industrial accidents about which national leaders are greatly concerned; it will also prevent loss of life through highway accidents, of which not less than 25% are due to drinking drivers and pedestrians.

7. It would, to an immeasurable degree, stop alcohol's blighting effects upon the brains and bodies of large numbers of American citizens, when the clearest brains and strongest bodies are needed to help America win.

What About Enforcement?

While War Prohibition presupposes proper enforcement of the law, we are fully aware of the danger of entrusting the enforcement of such law to political party administrations that do not believe in it. However, the nations
