THE DIVINE QUEST

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"I sought for a man among them, that should make up the hedge, and stand in the gap before me for the land, that I should not destroy it."

Consider what the Word declares of the conditions existing at the time and among the people with which these words are related. The charge God lays against them, through the prophet Ezekiel, reveals that they were guilty of extreme wickedness. "Thou has despised mine holy things, and hast profaned my Sabbath." The precepts of God had been rejected, and, as a consequence, there was widespread and reckless indulgence in sin. Domestic relationships, business transactions, and na. tional affairs, were alike suffering from the contaminating influence of the unchecked operations of evil forces. The entire land, the whole life-system of the nation, was sinking in moral corruption and decay.

This unhappy state of affairs was further aggravated by the unfaithfulness of the priest and prophet. The eyes that were supposed to recognize these daugerous developments were closed. The ears that were intended to hear the warnings of the Almighty against whom men were sinning, were stopped. The voices that were designed to cry aloud and spare not, to sound the trumpet of warning showing the people their transgressions and sins, were silenced. The priest and the prophet, the ordained messengers of God, were guilty, not only of failing to warn the people by drawing a line between the holy and the profane, the clean and the unclean, but were joining in a conspiracy to plunder the people to their own selfish gain. Furthermore, they daubed them with the untempered mortar of soft and soothing words saying, "Peace, all is well " claiming that the inspired message of God was one of good-will. Under these deplorable conditions, sin flourished, and Satan ruled with a free hand. Following their depraved inclinations, lulled into a sense of false security by the soothing messages of an unfaithful priesthood, men rushed violently down the steeps of moral degeneration. While appearances seemed to agree with the declarations of the prophets, and all seemed well, the Divine displeasure increased daily. Infinite mercy, capable of amazing and almost unlimited strain, was near exhaustion. He who is angry with the wicked ever yday, and maintains an unchanging attitude of intolerance toward sin of every kind and degree, foresaw the necessity of judgment, the pouring out of His indigation, the recompensing of their wicked pursuits by the burning of His consuming wrath. Such judgment appeared inevitable. The course which God is forced to take when men refuse every other mode of effort and every other method of approach, that course which results in man's suffering the dreadful consequences of his wilful and wicked ways,

seems now the only way to bring the nation to repentance.

But wait—there is one final hope! There is yet one possible alternative! And, though the people fully merit the suffering of judgment, behold how Divine love seeks to spare them from that painful scourge! See with what careful diligence and earnest desire He endeavours to quench the fires of His indignation. It is not His good pleasure that men should suffer, for "He doth not afflict willingly, nor grieve the children of men." And so the compassionate God grasps at this last hope, and looks for a man to make up the hedge and stand in the gap for the land, that He might not destroy it. If a man of suitable character could be found, one who, qualified for the mediatorial ministry, would surrender himself to this vicarious effort, judgment could be averted. A man could save a nation! An individual could become the redeemer of the multitudes! And so, with judgment sustained, and with the hope that this undesirable and fearful judgment-course might be abandoned, the Divine quest began. Into every town and city, into every home and every heart, He hopefully, patiently enters and pursues His search. Through the length and breadth of the land He travelled, to every inhabitant He makes his mission known, and seeks a favourable response. But sadly He returns, and heavy with the disappointment of His fruitless quest He records to the shame of that hapless people, "I sought for a man ... to make up the hedge, and stand in the gap . . . for the land, that I might not destroy it, but, I found none."
