The special meetings being held at Port Maitland are going on under the blessing of God. The saints are being fed and strengthened, and a few are seeking definite spiritual help and requesting prayer.

Rev. H. S. Dow expects to begin evangelistic meetings with Rev. G. R. Symonds and the church at Seal Cove, Grand Manan, N. B., on Sunday, Feb. 8th.
