## BEULAH ECHOES

Beulah Camp of 1942 will not soon be forgotten by those privileged to attend. Its influence will reach into the unending eternity. The Spirit-guided expositions of the Truth by our evangelist, the sweet fellowship of the saints in prayer and praise, the definite victories realized around the tabernacle altar, these are some of the outstanding features of this year's memorable Beulah Camp-meeting.

"I cannot recall a better Camp," said one of our older ministers. "I have enjoyed every year I have attended Beulah, but this has been the best of all," said one of our young people. Similar expressions were heard from all sides.

It was a great Camp for our young people. The largest crowd of young people in attendance in the history of the Camp (the number increases each year). Best of all, they were nearly 100% witnesses of the saving and sanctifying power of Christ Jesus. The young people's services, held each afternoon of the Camp on the tabernacle platform, were under the direction of the president, Rev. A. D. Cann, and were times of blessing.

The financial reports of our treasurers revealed we had a banner year in money received. Our Self-Denial Fund treasurer reported \$518.18 received, the treasurer of the General Fund, \$209.50. These totals are well in excess of any receipts for a previous year since the inception of our Y. P. A. ten years ago. \$380.25 was contributed to Foreign Missions, \$100.00 to Home Missions, by our S. D. Treasurer, with a good balance left on hand. The treasurer of the General Fund reports all obligations met, and a balance on hand of \$97.00.

Inspired by the generous support given our S. D. Fund during the past year we have set a new objective. In former years we have aimed to raise \$350.00 through this channel, the amount necessary to support one of our missionaries. This year we have set a minimum objective of \$500.00, the usual amount to go to Foreign Missions, and the remaining \$150.00 to go toward Home Mission extension work. Let's co-operate to reach, and go beyond this goal!

Echoes of Beulah Camp, 1942! They reverberate to bless and inspire, and so they shall continue to do, spurring us to more zealous effort for God and Holiness, helping to keep us diligently employed in the work and will of Him whom we delight to serve, until, by His good Providence, we are permitted to meet once again on the ground that to an ever-increasing multitude is enshrouded in sacred memory!

## HONOURABLE MENTION

We salute the Y. P. Societies of Marysville and Saint John who led the way in financial contributions for the past year. Marysville gave \$62.40 to the S. D. Fund, and Saint John sent in a total of \$58.71 to the General Fund. These amounts are not only highest for the year, but are record contributions to both funds for any single year since our or-

ganization. So we give honour to whom honour is due! Who will lead the way next year?

Dear Brother Cochrane:

It is with pleasure that I attempt to say a few words to the young people of your denomination through the Highway.

Since coming from Beulah, I have had an opportunity to realize what a spiritual "oasis" this Camp Meeting has been. I cannot but feel that no greater privilege could be given anyone than to be able to withdraw from the turmoil and pressure of the outside world, and for a few days, live in "Beulah" surrounded by the handiwork of God, and enjoy Christian fellowship with those who truly know Him. From the contacts I have made, and especially this year at Beulah, I am convinced that the Reformed Baptist young people are as fine a group as could be found anywhere and with more than the average possibilities.

But as we have already been shown, these times of refreshing such as we have just had, are only for one purpose and that is that we might go out into the coming seasons to be stronger and more aggressive in the work of the Lord.

In my very humble opinion, I cannot but feel that a mighty challenge has been laid at the door of your church. There are so many towns in the Maritimes that have no Holiness work at all, and if you do not reach out to them and take this territory for Christ, and in so doing expand your own church borders, you will have no excuse with which to face them at the judgment, for the fact remains that there is just no one else to do the job but you.

This presents a great challenge, and the steps you have taken to send out home missionaries in the coming year bespeaks the fact that there are those who have caught the vision. My prayer to God is that other young men and women, strong in the Lord, might be raised up to carry the work on.

I am sure your smallest problem is that of financing the work. God's resources will never go bankrupt. The promises of God will never go on a priority list. No one has a greater claim on the promises of God than those who believe them. Phil. 4:19—Matt. 15:7. I believe one of our biggest problems as Christian young people today arises from a lack of putting God to the test and proving Him.

I'm adding my prayers to yours that God may graciously lead and abundantly bless, and e'er another Beulah time comes, there may be many who will know Him because you didn't fail.

The older people cannot be expected to carry this load—many of them have given their lives to lay a good foundation for you to build on. I fancy I can hear their challenge to you:

"To you from falling hands we throw the torch,

Be it yours to hold it high."
