GOD'S PRICE FOR A REVIVAL (Continued)

If my people which are called by my name shall humble themselves and pray, and seek my face, and turn from their wicked ways, then will I hear from heaven, and will forgive their sins, and will heal their land. II. Chron-7-14.

You will note in the foregoing words of scripture that God offers to enter into a contract with His people. He says: If they will do certain things, then, I will do some things for them, which will result in a great revival. When God deals with men individually relative to the salvation of their souls, He makes His promise of salvation conditional. He says: "If, we confess our sins, he is faithful and just to forgive us our sins." Again: "If we walk in the light as He is in the light, etc., the Blood of Jesus Christ His Son cleanseth us from all sin." Notice he does not coerce, or compel any soul to confess his sin, that he may be forgiven, or to walk in the light after he has been forgiven, that he may be cleansed: But God lays down certain condi- if they turn from their wickedness and also tions, and says, If, etc. Our salvation is contingent upon our attitude toward His offer.

So if we will have a great revival such as this country needs, God's people, the church MUST accept, or take up the challenge.

Note God requires three things of us, and if we meet the divine requirements, He promises to do three things for us.

He says humble yourselves, pray and seek His face, and turn from your wicked ways. Then He will hear, forgive, and heal.

Please notice, the two-fold nature of sin suggested here, which requires a two-fold remedy to cure it. Sin exists in the form of wrong-doing, acts of sin, in violation of God's laws: These must be confessed, and forgiven to be disposed of. And these acts of sin are but the outcroppings of sin in another and more subtle form; sin in the form of depravity, which the apostle Paul calls the carnal mind, the flesh, our old man, or as our text suggests, sin in the form of a disease, which must be healed. This phase of sin is not cured completely by one work of grace. We may be forgiven, converted, or born again, and still have the disease of sin remaining in us, though its power will be greatly suppressed, and the outcroppings greatly reduced because of that measure of God's grace which we receive when we are regenerated or born again.

As multitudes of Christians have experienced and testified; that after they were converted they felt the stirrings or uprisings of carnality in the form of anger, jealousy, pride, or fear, etc., which greatly hindered them in their service for Jesus. Paul speaks of this condition as an internal warfare, when "the flesh lusts against the Spirit and the Spirit against the flesh, so ye cannot do the things that ve would."—Gal. 5-17.

So whether it is an individual, or church, or nation that God is dealing with, He prescribes the same remedy, viz.: forgiveness, for the penitent believer, and, cleansing, sanctification, or healing for the wholly consecrated believer; in order to be saved from both the guilt and disease of sin, which is the cause of all of man's trouble. This awful war, with all its attendant evils, which are many; Evils in the form of drunkenness, crime, immorality, are but the outcroppings of the unrestrained or unhealed disease of sin or depravity in men's hearts. Hitler is an example of what the depraved nature will do with men when it is allowed free rein.

Hear the apostle James: "From whence come wars and fightings among you? Come they not hence, even of your lusts that war in your members." A great many people are thinking that if we win this war, that all our troubles will be over, and while it is true that the end of the war, with success for the allies would bring relief to multitudes of people, yet even this would be only temporary, for as long as sin remains, or holds sway in men's hearts, there will be wars and rumors of wars, drunkenness and crime, among our young people, of which there is so much at the present time.

Only a genuine, scriptural revival, one that will go deep enough to reach the hearts of men, in regenerating and sanctifying, healing power, can meet this poor old sin-sick warridden world's need. In the very broadest sense of the term, Great Britain and the United States might classify among those spoken of in our text, which are called by His Name: that is, these are called Christian nations. Hence, if we do claim such an honor, it is very clear from God's requirement that is, from what we see and know of our national sins, that there will have to be a mighty housecleaning time if we are to expect God to favor us, and heal our land. Let us Pray!
