# THE HALIFAX MEETING

### Dear Highway Friends:

Knowing of your anxious desire to learn of the progress of the new work at Halifax, and desiring to give God praise for His blessing and providential leadings, we thought it best to write a brief report of the beginnings of this important effort.

Since early spring the Home Mission Board has been seeking to find a suitable building for a meeting at Halifax. During the summer our efforts were rewarded when, through Divine assistance, and the co-operation of Brother Norman Sanders, we were able to locate a suitable place. The building is located at the corner of Windsor and Cunard Sts., a busy intersection of the city. It is not large, but it is well-suited to our present needs.

Our meeting began the evening of August 19th. The attendance at this first service was very encouraging considering we were starting for a city where we had no work and few adherents. By Sunday night attendance had increased 80%. During the first week we were greatly encouraged. In attendance, giving and response to the truth the people responded wonderfully.

It seemed at first that it would be necessary for my wife and I to start the meeting alone, but through the goodness of God we had Rev. H. S. and Mrs. Mullen and Paul to assist us. Their ministry in song and in the Word was owned of the Spirit and appreciated by the people. The Mullen folks had to leave us Monday, but on Wednesday evening we were joined by Revs. F. A. Watson and G. A. Rogers, who will carry on in the services during the next few weeks.
