We are using more space than we need. \* \* \* More than that, we are shouting to the public that we are using these things while the public knows that we are a non-essential and purely luxury business \* \* \* The general public are skeptical!"—American Business Men's Research Foundation.

## "NEW DREAM HIGHWAY" FREE OF LIQUOR

It is interesting to watch the kind of buildings which appear on a new highway. It is essential that gasoline be purchased conveniently. Therefore, gas stations quickly spring up. Next come refreshment stands. Too frequently these are "road houses" which increase the number of fatal accidents on the road.

The new highway, costing \$70,000,000, connecting the vicinity of Harrisburg with Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, has every feature known to science to make it safe. Moreover, the Pennsylvania Turnpike Commission has decreed that there shall be no establishments on this "dream highway" where intoxicating beverages may be sold. The commission does not want the safety of the highway endangered by drinking drivers.—Union Signal.
