A GREAT CAMP MEETING

Beulah Camp of 1943 has come and gone. For ten glorious days we were privileged to enjoy fellowship with some of God's choicest saints in the peaceful and hallowed surroundings of that parcel of grounds which is a Bethel to a multitude of souls. Having returned to our various spheres of duty, and reflecting on the Camp Meeting as a whole, we feel that all will agree that it was truly a blessed time.

The attendance was unusually large throughout. The Sunday attendance was below what it has been in pre-war years, but the number present for the entire ten days was the largest for many years at least. It was by considerable larger than any remembered by the writer. The Tabernacle services were all largely attended, the dormitories were filled to overflowing, and the large dining hall at the hotel was unable to accommodate the people at nearly every meal of the last week. A beautiful spirit prevailed from the beginning and throughout the business, devotional, and evangelistic services. From thirty to eighty or ninety people met each morning at 6 o'clock for the sunrise prayer meeting. What a volume of intercession and praise ascended to God each morning! It seemed that this meeting was better than any for a number of years.

The evangelist was possessed of a tender and humble spirit, ministering faithfully in the Word. The messages by our own brethren were of a high order. The children's meetings, under the leadership of Lic. Thelma Rose were well attended, and the Young People's services, under the direction of the new president. Lic. Wilbur Mullen, taxed the seating capacity of the large Tabernacle platform. Without doubt, the number of young people attending the Camp this year was the largest of its history.

Rev. H. S. Wilson, president of the Alliance for this year, presided efficiently over all meetings.

The song leading and special singing, under the direction of Revs G. A. DeLong and H. S. Mullen, was the very best. Solos, duets. and quartettes were rendered in the spirit by our own capable talent.

Finances came amazingly. It would be interesting to know how many thousands of dollars were received into the various funds during the Camp period. The people literally piled money on the table on the last Sunday afternoon service. In a business session with a comparatively small number present, \$300 was raised for the down payment of a new parsonage at Woods Harbour, and \$67 was contributed to the Perth Church Fund. Every appeal was responded to with the liberality and cheerfulness characteristic of our people.

From beginning to end, and in every way it was a great camp meeting. A large number found definite victory at the Tabernacle altar. Old-fashioned weeping and praying resulted in glowing testimonies of victory. God was there!

A fitting climax to the Camp was the tra-

ditional hand-joining circle around the Tabernacle. A conservative estimate of the number in the ring, after scores of people had retired, would be five hundred. One of the brethren standing near me, one who has been a regular attendant at Beulah for many years, said: "I never saw it before in this fashion." Our hearts were thrilled as we joined with that company in singing, "Blest be the Tie that Binds," and then the National Anthems of the Empire and the U. S. A.

Yes, it was a great time in the Lord, and its blessed influence will remain with us as an inspiration to ardent and faithful labour during the year before us. Thank God for Beulah Camp or 1943!
