Dear Christian Friends:

For the benefit of those who were not privileged to be at Beulah I am pleased as corresponding secretary, to give you a brief report of our Missionary work. There is a growing interest in this department of our work and the Lord is blessing with increase in membership and finances. Several of our churches do not have organized missionary societies and yet make contributions each year. We trust they may be able to continue this good work and that every church will respond next year.

Last year we received reports from twenty-four organized societies showing a total of \$2676.43 raised for Missions. This year twenty-five reports were forwarded showing a total of \$ 3894.86. Of this amount \$2854.22 was raised for Foreign Missions and \$1040.64 for Home Missions.

May the Lord help us to be faithful in support of this worthy cause.

PASTORS AND SUNDAY SCHOOL SUPERINTENDENTS, PLEASE NOTE:

At the Alliance Meeting at Fredericton, Dec. 29th, 1942, a committee was appointed to investigate the possibility of adopting a more uniform plan of the obtainment and use of Sunday School literature, quarterlies, papers, etc.

On the report of that committee at the Beulah Alliance Sessions of this year, the following resolution was adopted: That we, as an Alliance, recommend to our Sunday Schools, the use of Sunday School literature published by the Wesleyan Methodist Publishing Co., of Syracuse, New York. It is further recommended that the proposed plan be adopted the first of the year 1944."

This decision was made after consideration had been given to the offer of three publishing companies. The Wesleyan Methodists offer us the following terms of reductions, providing we accept the plan as a denomination: 40% reduction on all their own publications, and 20% on any other supplies purchased from them but not published by them.

The large savings possible to our churches and denomination by the adoption of this plan will be apparent to all. The literature published by this company is now used by some of our schools and is highly recommended by them.

Will all Sunday Schools give this matter immediate consideration and report their decision to the editor of The Highway, Rev. B. C. Cochrane, Moncton, N. B.
