
LOCATION

Beulah Camp is located at Brown's Flats, Kings Co., New Brunswick, twenty-fine miles above the city of Saint John. It is on the western bank of the river, on Highway No. 2 and can be reached by road, rail or river boat from either Saint John or Fredericton.

There is a hotel at Beulah with a dining room which will seat 250 people. I can never forget my visit to and ministry in the Camp of June 30-July 9, 1939. I reached that section of Canada a little while after the King and Queen of England had paid their visit to Saint John and elsewhere in Canada. There was an upsurge of national and patriotic emotion which indicated that 3,000 miles of water and other unfortified 3,000 mile line on the southern border could not nullify the blood of our race or the common ideals of freedom. I found at the Camp a company of devout souls whose religion was to them a serious, vital matter. There was order and plan and program, but freedom and room for spontaneity of personality. I had good fellowship with those in charge, and all with whom I came in contact. I should love to see them all again and hope to do so in this life or the next. The camp has abundance of good buildings. My room was the prophet's chamber, just over the edge of the Saint John river, and on the door of my room was printed and fastened 2nd Kings 4:10. You may be sure it was a great comfort to me to be thus esteemed as a stranger so far from home. I have always been a lover of nature, and where can be found such a blend of beauty of stream and sky, of forest and sylvan depths and paths, as that Camp Ground! From hill top to river's brink, it is one array of beauty. I have seen the great rivers of my native land from the Hudson to the Columbia and Williamette, but none of them stand as rivals of the superbly beautiful Saint John. I saw it when the full moon poured its silvery light upon its tidedisturbed bosom. It seemed as if angels with gold-tipped wings played lively games upon its surface. At daytime the sky and clouds registered their azure and ermine in its depths.

RATIONING REGULATIONS

All those planning to attend the Camp and board at the Hotel, are required by Wartime Prices and Trade Board Rules to surrender ration books when purchasing meal tickets. Coupons are to be collected for sugar, butter, tea or coffee, and meat. Those who come for a day or less time than a coupon's ration would cover, are not required to surrender coupons. Those coming from the United States can obtain special books for use while in Canada, at the point of entry. There will be no difficulty in this matter if all co-operate. The officials only expect us to run as nearly as possible under the regulations now existing in the country.
