A SIGNIFICANT MEETING

Over the week-end of May 4-7, the National Association of Evangelicals for United Action met in its National Constitutional Convention at the Hotel La Salle, Chicago.

This organization, newly formed, represents the evangelical denominations of the continent, seeks to foster a spirit of fellowship and unity among all those bodies affiliating, and endeavours to gain concerted action and interest relative to the great issues of Christian truth for which we stand.

At the Chicago Convention over 800 delegates representing 69 denominations, assembled. One of the Nazarene pastors says of the meeting: "Never have we observed such a group with such varying ideas, where there was so much harmony." The holiness bodies were well represented at this convention and are among those in official capacity. Bishop Leslie Ray Marsten, of the Free Methodist Church, is second vice-president. Rev. John Huffman and Dr. Paul Lees are on the Advisory Committee, and Rev. Huffman is Editor of the official paper of the Association, "United Evangelical Action."

May God bless this new organization to the unifying of His people against the common enemy!

SPECIAL SERVICES

On Sunday morning, May 16th, the Church at Moncton had a special service in observance of the church debt clearance.

Twenty-four years ago, while Rev. S. A. Baker was pastor of the church, the building was raised and a new basement with Sunday school rooms, was made. Then the building proper was divided in the center, and the walls were moved to make the auditorium twelve feet wider. First class pews were installed and the work of renovation completed. When the task was finished, a debt of \$9,500 stood against the people.

Over a period of twenty-four years, the band of people who have constituted the church membership, and the loyal pastors who have served them, have worked together to reduce this great indebtedness. There have been times, during recent years, when the burden bearers were very few, and the load extremely heavy, but the faithful effort continued until on April 20th of this year, exactly twenty-four years from the day of the re-dedication services celebrating the completion of the remodelling contract, the last dollar was contributed and payment in full made.

Much credit is due to the sacrificial loyalty of both pastors and people, in the making possible this worthy accomplishment.

In the service of May 16th, Rev. H. C. Archer presented a brief historical sketch of the work, making a personal reference to many who have given largely during the years. The pastor, Rev. B. C. Cochrane, preached an appropriate message from I. Kings 21:3. Deverne Mullen, our talented Gospel singer, was present and brought several messages in song to the blessing of all present.

With deep fervency we praise the Lord for what He hath wrought, and pray that He will enable us to be true to the standard of holiness, that doctrine committed to our trust!
