THE WORLD'S GREATEST EXPLOSION

The most terrific explosion known within the span of recorded history occurred on Aug 27, 1883, when most of the island of Kratotoa lying in the Sundra Strait between Java and Sumatra, was blown entirely off the map by the force of a terrible volcanic eruption. When the violent eruption was finally over, in place of a pleasant tropical isle of eighteen square

miles, surmounted by a majestic volcano rising to a height of 1,400 feet, there remained only the sullen waters of the sea covering a cavity a thousand feet deep.

As a result of this terrific earth's upheavel, the forests and fields of the surrounding islands were buried under tons of dirt and rocks. The entire geographic outlines of the area changed, and an entirely new island was formed, but these are small items as compared to the widespread effects of this eruption the world over.

It is perhaps difficult to conceive just what an explosion occurred to make a change in the very maps of our globe. Maybe some of these effects, recorded in widely-scattered parts of the world, will lend some conception of an event which actually baffles and staggers the imagination.

At Batavia, one hundred miles away, the sky was so darkened by ashes that lamps had to be used in the houses at mid-day. The finer particles of dust, rising into the higher layers of the atmosphere, spread over North and South America, Europe and Asia, showing in unusually colored sunrises and sunsets, in weird blue moons and even the light of day was strangely affected.

The force of the detonation gave rise to an atmospheric wave which went around the world three and one-half times before it faded to a point to escape detection by instruments. Actual sounds were heard at Rodigues, 3,000 miles away; at Bangkok, 1,413 miles distant; on the Philippine Islands, 1,450 miles; at Ceylon, 2,058 miles; and in west and south Australia, from 1,300 to 2,250 miles away.

It is estimated that a column of dirt and stones shot up into the air seventeen miles or more when the top of Krakatoa blew off.

Of most serious consequences was the tidal wave which the eruption gave rise to. A great number of shorted waves were climaxed by one great ocean wave fifty feet high, which wrecked ships, destroyed towns, and created a death toll of 36,000 human lives. This great, great wave was experienced everywhere in Asiatic waters, reached Cape Horn, 7,818 miles away, and was felt in the English Channel after traveling 11,000 miles.

The eruption of 1883 was awe-inspiring and terrific beyond imagination.—Earl Chapin, in "Youth's World."
