SMOKING IN WARTIME

A prominent periodical has the following enlightening remarks to make to its readers on the subject of smoking in wartime:

"In normal times many persons smoke tobacco, especially cigarettes, to excess. During the war the habit seems to be much increased. In the Times (London) a physician, Sir Maurice Cassidy, says in a communication, that nobody who travels by road or rail can fail to be impressed by the amount of smoking in the fighting services. **Most of the men seem to have an unlimited supply of cigarettes,** which they never cease to smoke. When he asked if any attempt was made to curb their addiction they told him that it is very difficult not to smoke when everybody is smoking . . .

"Now these men are being trained to fight for their lives. Yet were they being trained for a soccer cup tie or a boat race, their smoking would be seriously restricted, if not stopped . . .

"We are rationed in meat, milk, eggs, sugar, butter and clothing. Surely, says Sir Maurice Cassidy, the time has come to ration tobacco, and thereby increase our efficiency."—London letter in the "Journal of the American Medical Association."
