

PERTH CHURCH AND PASTOR

"The zeal of the Lord of hosts hath performed this." Some two years ago Rev. S. G. Hilyard and his loyal band at Perth, N. B., caught a vision. Worshipping in a large but unchurch-like hall, they saw the need of a suitable place of worship, and, though few in number, dared to believe God. Surely "the people had a mind to work" and the Lord was on hand to help.

A church at Upper Hainesville, N. B., occupied some years ago by a group of our people who had moved elsewhere, was found to be available. This church was dismantled and moved to Perth and work was begun immediately. The foundation was laid and work on the superstructure began. Because of a shortage of help and materials progress was slow, but under the faithful and ardent leadership of Brother Hilyard, the work went on. Late last fall the building was completed, and Sunday, May 7th, the house was dedicated to the glory of God. It is a beautiful building and well situated, complete with furnace heating equipment, pews, modern fluorescent lighting system, etc.

Money has come in to assist with this work and the people of the Perth church and community greatly appreciate the interest and liberality of each donor. On the day of the dedication it was found that there was a deficit of \$700 against the building. Rev. P. J. Trafton presented this need to the people, asking them to give sufficient to clear this indebtedness, and \$150 as a love gift to the pastor, Rev. S. G. Hilyard, who so untiringly and unsparingly laboured in the construction of the building. The response to this appeal surprised every one. The people present subscribed \$1025! As an extra they gave in the collections of afternoon and evening services over \$100.

The people of Perth are worthy of highest commendation. Rev. S. G. Hilyard has the respect of all for his faithful leadership in this project. May God bless this work and make it a bright witness to holiness in the town of Perth!
