Dear Highway Friends:

I shall endeavor to give a summary of my year's work. At the close of Beulah Camp 1943. I supplied the following pulpits: R. B. churches at Woodstock and Moncton, and the Nazarene Church at Clifftondale, Mass.

On Aug. 25th Rev. F. A. Watson and I went to Halifax to labor in our Holiness Mission that had been opened in that city by Revs. B. C. Cochrane and H. S. Mullen. Brother Paul Mullen soon joined us and proved to be a great musician. Brother Watson and I alternated in preaching. After Brother Watson left, Rev. G. A. DeLong was our co-worker. For a period Brother Paul and I carried on. In October Rev. and Mrs. H. S. Mullen came for two weeks. I certainly enjoyed the fellowship and preaching of our workers. We found a few people in Halifax who loved the truth we preached. They had waited for years for some one to come with holiness.

One sister was afraid that possibly we had not come to stay. She and others were soon relieved along that line. Since I left Halifax, on Nov. 22nd, Sister Miriam Sanders has been carrying on nobly. On March 22nd, 1944, Rev. B. C. Cochrane, Lic. W. Mullen and I assisted Siser Sanders in organizing a Reformed Baptist Church in Halifax. We have also purchased a beautiful church lot in a residential section of that rapidly growing city. God bless our work at Halifax.

On Nov. 24th-25th Rev. H. S. Dow and I were delegates for our denomination to the convention in Toronto where "The Canadian Holiness Federation" was formed. This proved to be a very interesting convention. May holiness spread throughout Canada.

From Dec. 12th to July 2nd I was supply pastor at the R. B. Church in Amherst, N. S. I was not quite a stranger in Amherst. I had labored there the previous year in evangelistic services. Our crowds were not large at Amherst, but we did find a few who stood by

with their financial and spiritual support. Besides caring for their pastor each week they remembered us at Christmas with cash. Before we left them to go to Beulah Camp about 25 friends met at the home of Mrs. Jollymore and gave us another token of their appreciation of my labor. During that pleasant evening Deacon Bruce Logan in behalf of the congregation presented me with a beautiful book and cash amounting to \$25.00. I felt unworthy of such a kind expression. God bless the little band at Amherst under the leadership of Rev. and Mrs. H. S. Mullen.

At the close of our Quarterly at Amherst, Rev. J. A. Owens and Lic. H. McGeorge assisted us one week in special services. We enjoyed their messages. I carried on one week alone. God helped us and we saw some victory.

During my stay at Amherst I had the privilege of holding a few services in the home of Mr. and Mrs. William Brander, Northport, N. S. Mrs. Brander and others are carrying on a Sunday School in that place. God bless them in their noble work.

I was absent from Amherst from April 10th to May 12th. During that time Rev. H. C. Archer supplied the pulpit at Amherst. His messages were greatly appreciated.

During the month that I was away from Amherst I visited my father and other members of the family at Benton, N. B. Then I spent two weeks with my wife, who is caring for an aged father at Saugus, Mass. After my two weeks in Massachusetts, wife and I spent two pleasant weeks in Maine and N. B. While in Maine we were entertained in the home of Rev. and Mrs. H. L. Robertson. Brother Robertson and his good people desired some evangelistic services. For the brief period from April 30th to May 7th we labored with Rev. H. Robertson in his fine church. We didn't see all we desired in that brief time, but we did see some victory. We enjoyed our labor with this good brother and his faithful people. They embarrassed me with their generous offering. May God bless Rev. and Mrs. Robertson in the coming days in Monticello, Maine.

During Easter week I enjoyed laboring with Rev. and Mrs. B. C. Cochrane in their church in Moncton, N. B. At present I am supplying this pulpit in Moncton for three weeks. I enjoy preaching to these people who love the truth of holiness. Brother and Sister Cochrane are greatly appreciated in their church and in this city. May God use them in a great harvest of souls.
