## WHEN A YOUNG MAN ATTENDED CAMP MEETING

Did you ever think of the difference between pleasure and joy? The former is something that does not last; the latter stays with one. The Bible speaks of "the pleasures of sin for a season." (Heb. 11:25). But Jesus said to His disciples: "Your joy no man taketh away from you." (John 16:22).

Peter Cartwright had been a seeker of worldly pleasure. With all his energy he was "out for a good time." But the delights of sin left him with a hungry heart. As he neared his seventeenth birthday he realized that his godly mother had a joy that he had never known. He began to see the folly of his wicked ways.

Young Cartwright lived in Kentucky many years ago. A camp meeting was to be held at a place called Cane Ridge, in that state. He decided to attend.

It was one of the most famous camp meetings ever held in this country. If I recall it correctly, the attendance reached the enormous number of twenty thousand. Many hundreds of people were swept into the kingdom of God.

At that camp meeting Peter came to the awfulness of his pleasure-seeking, its selfishness, its rebellion, its defiance of a loving Heavenly Father's will. His heart was broken; he began to seek salvation as wholeheartedly as he had before sought sinful pleasure.

Jesus said something about seeking and finding. Was this the case with Peter Cartwright then? Let us see.

In my mind's eye I see him kneeling at an altar on the camp ground; with my mind's ear I hear him cry with agonized earnestness: "God be merciful to me a sinner!" And then
