DISTRICT RALLIES

Article 4a of the by-laws in the constitution of the Reformed Baptist Young People's Association reads this way: "There shall be in connection with the Association four district Associations, corresponding with the quarterly meeting districts, which shall hold two meetings a year, in September and March, in in each district."

The idea embodied in our Y. P. Assoc. constitution, with respect to district rallies, still holds good. The chief reason why the plan has not materialized, has not been due to the war, scarcity of young people, or the absence of a place to meet, but rather for the lack of initiative in getting the district organized, and the young people stirred into an active frame of mind.

We, being away for the last few years, plead ignorant as to whether or not any districts have been actually organized, or whether or not any rallies have been held since the or- the goodness of God, and said: ganization date in 1932. We doubt if there has been more than half a dozen of the latter, but according to our constitution there should have been, between the years 1932-1944, at least 96, yes, 96 different rallies, figuring four districts with two rallies each per year, over a period of 12 years.

This is astounding! But it is not merely becuse our constitution calls for the district rally plan, or that we want to emphasize the failure of the past that we bring this to your attention; rather, we would forget the things that are behind and press forward to a fresh season of awakened interest and renewed activity in our young people's work .

There never was a time when our young people needed so much what friendly Christian gatherings can supply. The prevailing moral condition is a constant menace to the youth of our land. But who or what is going to meet the spiritual needs of our young people if not the church? THE CHURCH MUST! Then we must begin. Youth rallies can be of great benefit to the individual, to our societies, and to our work in general. The recent rally in Moncton proves the point, and already Dis-
