Dear Highway:

Just a few lines from this part of the wide harvest field.

Our hearts have been cheered, encouraged and warmed from time to time as the generous donations keep coming in from the interested friends of the Holiness work in Halifax. Already a splendid total has been realized towards the purchase of the very desirable lot we have obtained in this large city. But we should build a church right away and that will cost considerable too. However, our God whom we serve is able to enable us to undertake great projects for His glory. And truly a strong pure Holiness work here in this great and wicked city is a tremendous need, and would be indeed for His glory. If, without Holiness no man shall see God, then this need becomes a million times enhanced, and it should lay a burden upon our hearts, of prayer and concern and faith that God will raise up such a witness in Halifax to that fact, that no one will arrive at heaven's gate, from Halifax, to say, in dismay: "No one ever told me I had to be holy to enter heaven—and it's too late now to become holy!" Oh, dear friends, when we stop to think on those sol-

emn words of Jesus, in Matt. 7:22-23, of the many who are doing and saying wonderful things in His name now, but who do not have the fruits of Holiness, and in that great day coming they will hear him say to them, "I never knew you." How great is the danger of deceiving ourselves and saying that because we can say and do great things in His name that therefore we are alright in His sight. Yet we read in His word that Love is the great essential, without which all eloquence, understanding, knowledge, faith, philanthropy and sacrifice are valueless, and those possessing these things, yet lacking love, are nothing! What is true sanctification or Holiness? Is it not being cleansed from everything incompatible with Divine Love and being filled with that love of God, shed abroad in our hearts by the Holy Ghost which is given unto us? "By their fruits ye shall know them." "By this shall all men know that ye are My disciples, if ye have love one to another." God help us to possess and profess this grace and so live it that the world shall know even in these days that it works.

Before closing I wish to speak a little of one feature of our Halifax Mission which is, perhaps, unique. One day a friend asked if we would open the Mission on a certain night each week, having it heated, etc., and open to any and all who, like herself, felt the great need of a place of unmolested quiet where they might spend an hour in prayer. Thus was born our Monday night "Hour of Prayer" service. It is still just that—an hour devoted to prayer alone, although we do read a short scripture just before kneeling to pray. Members and friends of the Holiness Mission unite with us in these services and we have some of the sweetest and most helpful seasons of prayer—Jesus always attends them, and we get refreshed and blessed and strengthened. Our vision becomes renewed and our faith inspired, and we feel we are getting more under the burden of prayer which is the mark of the people of God as described in Ezekiel 9:4. Just read that again. Personally I would not want to miss one of these prayer services—they mean a great deal to me spiritually even should I be the only other one there besides Jesus.

We have recently suffered the loss of two good friends and supporters of the Mission in their being posted elsewhere in Canada. They are Brother Byggdin (R. C. A. F.), and Sister Ferguson (W. R. C. N.). We miss them but realize that our loss is some others' gain, for we know these to be staunch Christians who will strive to shine for Jesus wheresoever they may be located.

We still covet your earnest prayers for the cause of Holiness in Halifax. "Let us not be weary in well-doing for in due season we shall reap, if we faint not." May God bless and reward each dear one who has contributed either by prayer or money towards this worthy work!
