ABSENTEEISM

A new name for an old disease

It seems that this war has been responsible for taking certain words which hitherto had not been used very much, and pressing them into service where they have become very common. In fact there are many terms in use today which Webster did not know about when he compiled his dictionary.

This word Absenteeism has only recently come into common use, although for many years the human family has been afflicted with this same trouble, or disease. For many years it has been confined mostly to religious circles, and we remember how the old folks, the faithful ones in the church, used to call it Morbus Sabbaticus, "Sunday sickness," and laugh at those whom they said were afflicted with this peculiar disease. But, since it has spread to secular life, it is not regarded as a joke, or something to be laughed at. Those in authority, who are trying to produce the largest amount of war materials, look upon Absenteeism as a very serious condition, which greatly impedes the progress of our allies in this war. These military-minded men tell us that the war is being prolonged and hundreds of our men are suffering and dying on the battlefields because they cannot get guns, tanks, planes, etc., fast enough to fight with. And the men at home who are holding good jobs with big pay, and are supposed to be working in the war maufacturing plants, are absent from their posts of duty far too many days, which is a great loss to the allied

Well, I can tell these overseers, bosses, heads of the war plants, officers, statesmen, lawmakers, those in authority, how they can greatly reduce this complaint of Absenteeism. I can tell them in just a few words. Stop manufacturing beer and strong drink, so that the labourers can't buy it, and get drunk; for the reason that so many of them are absent is because they are drinking themselves drunk, and then taking time to sober up.

Th governments and the people who vote for the government that permits the brewers to manufacture and sell strong drink, and many of these are church members, are the ones who are responsible for much of the absenteeism and for much of the loss of life among our soldiers, and they are the ones who are guilty of murder, and should be imprisoned for life.

Well "so much for that." If absenteeism is a crime in secular life, and, as those in authity, says. is playing into the hands of Hitler: Then what shall we say about those, who are absent from their posts of duty in religious circles?

Those who profess to love Jesus but rarely come to prayer meeting, where Jesus promises to meet with his people that they might receive inspiration, spiritual instruction and help, and contribute the same to others who come? What shall we say about those who are living on the benefits of Christian civilization, who never come to church or contribute anything to the great cause of Christ, or, what about so many church-members who have fallen in this very common habit of attending church only once on Sunday, then stay at home or visit friendes Sunday afternoon and evening? If men in secular life by their

enemies, the Axis powers, can people in religious life be absent from the service of God and the church, when it is possible for them to be there, and not be guilty of contributing to the support of our enemy, the devil? Listen to what our Lord says on this subject. He that is not with Me is against Me, and he that gathereth not with Me scattereth. Luke 11-23.

According to the foregoing words of Jesus, there is no such thing as a neutrality law operating in the kingdom of God. We are all beligerents and are fighting for Jesus in his cause, or we are fighting against Him. That seems to make absenteeism a very serious offence in the church, for if we by our indifference are not helping to win souls to Jesus, then by our influence we are hindering them from coming, and are helping the old devil to damn them.

May God help us to do somtehing about it.

One hundred dollars of this amount was given by Mrs. Norman Mooer in memory of her husband, who gave his life in the service of his king and country, on March 3rd.

One of the most precious services of the series was a Covenant meeting held on Saturday afternoon. The blessing of the Lord was truly upon this service while saints rejoiced in Him and told of what their church had meant to them and pledged themselves to the perpetuation of our Covenant.
