Mr. and Mrs. Albert Hopper of Lewisville. N. B., are mourning the loss of a loved one from their family. Their son, Pilot Officer Lloyd Hinson (Laddie), was killed recently in a plane crash during air operations overseas.

He answered the call for King and Country in May, 1941, enlisting in the R.C.A.F., and pursued his course of instruction through several training stations. He learned in life to be content with living, finding love of service reward enough. His experiences of being in the skies, mingling with the clouds, climbing higher, ever higher, made love of God and service very real, and in the words of Minton C. Johnston, a great

"You feared when first you saw me fly, And stood quite breathless till again From out the clouds you saw the plane Glide gently to the field near by.

You said the ground was safe, secure, That men were never made with wings, That they should trust in firmer things, And always keep their footing sure.

Laddie was born in Moncton January 17th, 1920 He attended Moncton High School. He received his wings at Dafoe, Sask., in the fall of 1942, and went overseas early in January 1943. On the morning of July 19th, 1944, at about 5.20 a.m. he, with his comrades, took wing to carry out an operational flight but the plane crashed on the outward trip and there he found God by his side. He leaves to mourn their loss, his parents, eight sisters and six brothers. He was the youngest of the family.
