Fred Allen, radio and screen comedian, who likes to be known as "the intellectual's Jack Benny," said, according to the Chicago Daily News: "Being a funny man is a grim business. It's the pace that kills. The machine age is destroying spontaneous humor."

"Take the average radio comedian today" 'llen waved despairingly—"he's just a 'mouth' a mere middleman between his corps of ghostwriters and the public. You could train a bright parrot to do as well."

"Continual deadlines, and the psychological need to hold listener-attention by snapping out jokes at so many per minute," he said, "simply make it impossible to maintain a high standard of humor. It's mostly assembly-belt comedy these days."

"In the days when I played vaudeville," Allen reminisced, "a comedian would spend several months in perfecting a routine and then play it all over the country. Now, someone like Bob Hope needs a dozen writers to think up scores of gags each week. It's a miracle some of them are as good as they are."

This comes as no surprise to the Bible lover, for he has had the benefit of the following experience of King Solomon before him: "I said in mine heart, Go to now, I will prove thee with mirth, therefore enjoy pleasure: and, behold, this also is vanity. I said of laughter, It is mad: and of mirth,
