## SOME THINGS A REVIVAL MEETING WILL NOT DO

For some fourteen years I have been holding evangelistic and revival meetings in various denominations throughout the United States. God has granted seekers in every meeting or campaign but in some places we have had real revivals while elsewhere we have had just protracted meetings that seemed too protracted, even for ten days or two weeks! There are some things that seem to be expected of revival meetings that these meetings just will not do.

1 All the special services and revival efforts in the world will not compensate for a lack of pastoral calling during the rest of the year. A fanatic is one who expects results without due care to the conditions that precede those results. Many a pastor has been disappointed in the results of his revival campaign, but the evangelist can not accomplish in a few nights of preaching what should have been accomplished by pastoral calling and door to door visitation long before the meeting started.

2. A revival meeting will not compensate for a lack of personal evangelism on the part of the laity. John the Baptist brought his disciples to Jesus, Andrew brought Peter, his brother, to Jesus, and Phillip having found for himself the Messiah of Israel, went and told Nathaniel and brought him to the Lord. So the early church grew by that personal contact and witnessing for Jesus. There are many people that can be brought to the house of God by this means, whom advertising and a special program will never reach. A successful meeting depends much upon the laity bringing their friends, families and kinfolk to the meeting.

3. A revival meeting will not bring a burden of prayer. It is too late to urge the people to begin to pray and attend special prayer services at the time the meeting starts. With services every night added to the cares and busy hours of everyday life, there will not be found just too much time for special prayer. Far better that special prayer meetings be held several weeks prior to the meeting and that a chain of prayer be formed and working long

before the evangelist preaches his first message. When these special prayer services are held for weeks before the meeting and people have been praying and fasting for a meeting and souls, half the battle is already won. Have the people and church prayed up before the meeting begins.

4. The best evangelist in the church has no appeal to the outside world unless they know he is in town. The crowds gathered to hear the preachers of the early church as it was "noised abroad." Advertising will pay big dividends if it is the proper type. Of course, a a big sign on the church is a necessity. Notice the display of signs and lights on the average theater today. Newspaper advertising is very effective if it is kept up for a period of time. Radio is good and handbills are just fair. But what ever the advertising, see that it reaches the outside world. In the past few years I have seen hundreds of dollars worth of handbills, cards, etc., left lying on the piano, the pulpit or some table after the meeting closed. Nor does it seem worth while for the church people to take a number home with them and never pass them out. Far better to buy some one cent stamps and get the telephone book and send the advertising to strange names in your section of town. Any meeting and any preacher is worth your best in advertising.

5. Finally brethren, don't have too many revivals in one year. A church becomes decidedly lop-sided if it has too many meetings in a year. Far better for the pastor to "do the work of an evangelist" himself and make his services from Sunday to Sunday times of strong evagelistic appeal. I have observed that where a church has one or two special meetings a year, and in between these meetings strives for spiritual devotional services with people at the altars during the regular meetings, it is much easier to have a victorious evangelistic campaign. Change your type of evangelist from meeting to meeting and don't be afraid to call some of the men that are not so well known. Some may like those that you do not especially care for and every man will reach some. Above all, let the glad news go out, "Christ receiveth sinful men."-Pilgrim Holiness Advocate.
