We have heard a few reports on Beulah and do praise the Lord for the way He has worked. We were much interested in the school for the young people and do trust that it was a time of great blessing.

We certainly enjoy getting The Highway and reading the good messages and hearing about our people. We join in praise to God for the safe return of so many of our boys. Several of the girls with whom I worked at home have been bereaved of their husbands in this war. We do sympathize with all those who are sorrowing.

The enemy is busy in our midst but we are looking to the Lord to give Victory and to liberate souls from the bondage of sin and to translate them into the Kingdom of His dear Son. Jesus never fails.

Dear Highway Friends:

The last few weeks have been delightfully cool and sunny. We have not had rain for weeks so the countryside is dry and yellow.

Since our last letter we have been to our July Hartland Quarterly and to other outposts as well. The Quarterly was a time of blessing and help to us all. Several were baptized on the closing Sunday. Delegates were also present from the Paulpietersburg Location Church which asked to join us at our last Grootspuit Quarterly.

Last week several of our Transvaal workers went to Mbuca for a week's house-to-house visitation and revival services. This is the first time this type of work has been carried on since we have been out here. This week others have gone across the Mozaan on a similar errand. The Lord bless them!

Next week D. V. we shall have another session of our periodical Bible school for our preachers and workers. Pray that our efforts may be crowned with success.

I have been rather busy the last two or three months putting the finishing touches on several buildings here at Altona. The clinic or Hospital has now been plastered and murescoed and is practically ready for use. We lack equipment such as beds, cupboard for medicines, and chairs. The preacher's house and the store-room were also plastered.

Since school closed Harold has been helping me plaster the outside of a brick kiln and in burning 10,000 brick. We are just putting the finishing touches on two new rooms and a verandah on the front of the house, which

are taking the place of a small 6 ft. wide verandah built some years ago. This much needed addition will give us a room for our Quarterly visitors and provide for a combination study and boys' sleeping quarters.

We were recently very fortunate in opening up a strong spring or well just above the mission house, about one hundred yards away. A little later I got some piping at an auction sale and Harold has installed this for us so we have running water in the house. I want to extend the pipes to the garden in time so that we can have a few fresh vegetables in the winter and early spring.

We are trying to get bricks made at Hartland for a Hospital kitchen and store-rooms in connection, with the government school feeding scheme.

At the auction sale I mentioned I also bought a house for \$50. I have been busy dismantling this also. It provided us with nine windows, seven doors, electric light wiring, some timber and other odds and ends. The same materials bought now would probably cost \$200. The Lord has providentially provided us with much needed materials for repairs, alterations or new building.

In spite of all our building and repairs much remains to be done yet both here and at Hartland if buildings are to be repaired, re-roofed, and in some cases rebuilt. Then too there are some outposts still crying for churches and other facilities. Then too we still have hopes of Extension work and who knows but a new Mission Station.

I have tried to give you an idea of one phase of our activities and needs. Pray that the Lord will give us strength and provide us with the means of carrying out our plans.

Dear Highway Friends:

Since Beulah Camp we have been active in special services on this field, having held two series, first at Lower Southampton and later at Middle Southampton. Concerning the first meeting we have little to report. The main difficulty there was to get a hearing. Brother F. A.
