**Y. P. EDITOR INTERVIEWS
 BEULAH EVANGELIST***

- Q. Is this your first trip to the Maritimes?
 A. Yes.
- Q. What is your outstanding impression of Beulah Camp?
 A. I was impressed with the holy atmosphere that pervaded the grounds. I have felt very little of the secular spirit that occasionally seems to accompany some camps.
- Q. Would you say that our young people are basically the same as holiness young people elsewhere?
 A. Yes, I feel that they are much the same.
- Q. Would you say that it is any harder for young people today than, say, fifty years ago?
 A. I don't think so, but it will take a different approach to the problems they face. Every generation must make its own adjustments, but the basic relationships are the same.
- Q. Inasmuch as holiness young people are forbidden to indulge in so-called "worldly amusements," would you make some practical suggestions as to what young people can do for their recreation?
 A. First, I might say that many amusements are simple and quite harmless in themselves, but harm arises in our use of them. I feel that Christian young people can find enough to do to fill their recreation periods. I like to play tennis, and even go roller-skating, if it is not in a rough environment. Young people can have sings, and really try to learn new songs. In this way they will be a help to the pastor. A band of young people can have fun and do much good by getting together some used clothing and food supplies and calling on some of the poor families in the community. The field of enjoyable and useful service is large.
- Q. Do you have any other observation that you might care to make relative to our young people today?
 A. I feel that there is a great opportunity for young people to be original for Christ. What I mean is this: God calls people to other types of work besides the ministry. Think of the advantages a young person has in witnessing for Christ, maybe in ways that a minister couldn't. Many people just shut up like a clam when they see the preacher coming. A job might only be the avenue of service for doing special work for Christ. Think of it, young people!
