A TRIBUTE

I feel like writing a word of tribute to the memory of our esteemed friend and brother, Eugene Wilcox, of Wood Island, Grand Manan. A Prince in Israel has fallen! I knew him over a period of thirty-three years or more. The longer I knew him the more highly I regarded him. One had to know him intimately to really appeciate him.

I shall never forget an occasion at Beulah, possibly the first year I met him. Brother L. T. Sabine and I went extra early to the sunrise meeting in the Tabernacle. Brother Wilcox was already there, which was perfectly natural for him. We three were kneeling at the old mourner's bench in prayer. Suddenly, as though rocketed into the air by some unseen force, he leaped to his feet, and leaped again and again, clapped his big calloused hands, and with head thrown back, shouted aloud the praises of God. The glory fell around, and Brother Sabine and I got to our feet and joined in the celebration.

My soul is definitely blessed, and I weep tears of joy right now as I write, with the memory of it. How the Lord did honor and bless that man! I well recall what he said, when he seemed to want to apologize a bit for being so noisy. His exact words were: "Lord, I did not want to geyser!" I should like to be near a geyser like that often. It was warm glory, right from Heaven.

Our brother was a man of prayer, and dwelt deep in God, and appreciated the deep truths of the Word. It was while serving as his pastor two years that I got to know him best. I considered him as near an ideal layman as I ever ministered to. Though a man of opinions, and not easily swerved from an idea, yet he fully regarded the office of the clergy, and was quietly deferential to the decisions and wishes of the pastor. He had a rare gift for apt and practical illustrations. I recall times when I struggled to bring out some point of truth, when an opportunity was in order for testimonies and exhortation, he could take what I had hinted at and illustrate it and make it as clear as daylight. One had only to hint at a point and he would grasp it. He knew well the doctrine of holiness, as well as the experience, and he knew when it was being preached logically and scripturally. He never was fooled by weak and unscriptural arguments against the doctrine.

I have said, and repeat it, that a doctrine that will produce a Christian character as good and useful as was Brother Wilcox, needs not much further argument to prove its worth. Any denial of the doctrine and experience has just come too late. The influence of this godly man will live on for generations May God raise up a multitude of men like him.
