We had planned to leave there that day, leave our boys at school and come home, but Engene was sick with a very bad cold and he didn't think the tires were strong enough to go home and then return for the wedding the following week. He thought he would cross the river by horse to get our wedding clothes but he wasn't well enough, so we stayed and helped along the preparations for the wedding.

The morning after the wedding we left very early. Our older boys had been present for the occasion and their school starts at 7.30 a. m. We just reached Commondale to gind that another tire was just about finished. Eugene changed it and we just reached Moolman when it blew out. The mechanic thought it couldn't be repaired but Eugene took off his coat and went to work and by going slowly we reached Piet Retief safely, did the necessary errands and reached Altona about four o'clock in the afternoon. We thank God so much for journeying mercies.

I have been very busy since we returned, getting everything in running order again and tending sick people. So many poor sick babies, etc., I have had about thirty sick people to tend these last few days.

We do pray for extra strength for the winter months for building and extension work. Engene is feeling quite a lot better and has much work that he wishes to accomplish. We are praying for our dear homeland friends and trust that Beulah Camp of 1945 will be a great blessing to many. May God richly bless you all, is our daily prayer.
