gold standard than there has been for God's standard. There has been more regard for statistics than for salvation. Shekels in the treasury was often a greater objective than souls at the altar. The praise of man for a great report was more desired than the blessing of God for a great revival.

The Church must get to Pentecost! Those who have been there and left must go back; and those who have never been there must go forward and press onward until its abiding realities are personal possessions. Pentecost—the real Pentecost, the costly Pentecost, such as the early Church knew—will end the retreat and restore the initiative to the Church. Pentecost is our need. It will not only give the Church a rebirth, it will astonish the world; it will win new recruits for its advancing armies, and it will restore the Church to its Divinely-appointed place and power as the Bride and Body of Christ, the pillar and the ground of the truth; the Divine institution left to perpetuate the Spirit of Christ and to promote His work.

Let us cease retreating. Let us regain the offensive; and, under God, let us demand unconditional surrender of the diabolical forces of unrighteousness.
