HOW TO HAVE A GOOD CAMP MEETING

Camp-meeting season is near, and a few suggestions might help:

1. Get ready! Begin now to prepare and lay aside certain things, as soap, towels, mirror, rubbers, umbrella, mosquito netting, sheeting for curtains, etc.

2. Be on time! Go early, sit in front, and pray through, either for yourself or for others. Help bring the tide up, for if you wait till it is high, you may be swept off your feet.

3. Look for a chance to bless others. Smile at the stranger, especially if he looks lonely or discouraged. Take him aside and pray with him, hand him a song book, pay for his meal, and you will soon feel at home yourself and forget that you are unnoticed.

4. Don't get "tried!" If your tent or bed is not just so, and if you are not invited to sit or dine with big folk, remember you are not there to show off. Keep saying to yourself, "Everything is better than I deserve! How glad I should be to sit on a low bench and drink in the deep truths of God. Thousands would rejoice if they had my opportunities."

5. Walk in the light! If you get new and strong light, do not back down or criticize; nor go to the other extreme and "cast away your confidence." But hold steady until you can catch your equilibrium. Remember, new light brings conviction, but not necessarily condemnation, unless you resist it. You should welcome conviction, for this means enlargement, but you should refuse to get under condemnation.

6. Lay aside for expenses. Plan as far as possible to pay your own way, plus help lift the burdens of others. If you cannot do so in hard cash, don't sit around and talk, but pitch in and do something. You can sweep, dust benches, place chairs, wipe dishes, pray with seekers, or stand at the entrance and shake hands or give out tracts. The above could also apply to revivals and conventions.

Dear reader, I declare before God, if you will carry these things out, you will likely return home refreshed and enlarged in soul, mind and body. Try it!
