The death of Frederick Barr took place at his home in Lower Line Queensbury, York Co., N. B., at an early hour Saturday morning, Jan. 13th, at the age of 80 years. He had been ill a few weeks. Mr. Barr was well known, highly respected and industrious and will be greatly missed in the home and community. He leaves to mourn besides his wife, three sons Clifford, of Queensbury; Pte. Harry, with the R. C. A. M. C., overseas; Ralph, at home; four daughters, Mrs. Fred Cliff, North Devon; Mrs. Lloyd Sloat, Keswick Ridge; Mrs. Elwood Fox, Southampton; Miss Lottie, at home; several grandchildren and great-grandchildren and other relatives and many friends. The funeral was held at his late home on Monday, Jan. 15th, at two o'clock and was conducted by Rev. P. M. DeLong (U. B.) assisted by Rev. P. J. Trafton, Rev. M. H. Manuel (U. C.) and Rev. F. A. Watson. Interment was in Macnaquac cemetery. A male trio composed of Rev. F. A. Watson, Donald Cochrane, Cecil McDonald sang three appropriate hymns, accompanied by Mrs. Cecil McDonald at the organ. Mr. Barr made a profession of religion quite early in life but wandered away from the fold. He was restored to the favor of God at the 1944 Camp Meeting at Beulah and died trusting in Jesus.
