The Scribes and Pharisees had so added to the traditions of the law that one of their leaders confessed, "No common person can be pious"; no one who had not the time and opportunity to be skilled in the law and its traditions could keep them all. That was true. It was not an easy religion. There were heavy burdens and grievous to be borne and those who bound them upon the people would not move them with one of their fingers. Matt. 23:4.

King Jeroboam for political reasons offered his people an easier religion. He said, "It is too much for you to go up to Jerusalem." (I Kings 12:28). This subtle approach appealed to sloth. King Jeroboam succeeded in his scheme. But he started the ten tribes in a path of disobedience that grew steadily worse until it ended in their captivity and dispersal among the heathen. Easy religion didn't pay.

Pure and undefiled religion does have a lofty standard. It calls men to turn from their sin to Jesus Christ as their Lord and Saviour. This is a big order and can only be accomplished by the aid of the Holy Spirit. Furthermore this religion does offer the proper ease. As we come to Jesus with our heavy load of guilt we find rest. Even as we pull with Him in the yoke of service we find rest unto our souls. (Matt. 11:28,29).
