WHY NOT MORE REVIVALS?

"Is there not a cause?" I Sam. 17-29. There are doubtless several things which contribute to, or detract from the success of a revival. First of all, we believe that the Holy Spirit is the greatest factor to the success of any religious meeting.

The preacher should have a special anointing for every service, for he cannot depend upon past blessings. Neither can he depend too much upon his good sermons which he has preached before and which have been a means of blessing to previous services. He will doubtless preach sermons which he has preached before, perhaps several times, but he will need to pray over them until he receives fresh inspiration from God, and those old truths grip and inspire his own soul, if they are to be effective in convicting others of their need.

Furthermore, the church members and pastor where the services are held should also have a special anointing by the Spirit, which wll be expressed in a great burden of prayer for needy souls, and also in great liberty in witnessing for Jesus to His saving and sanctifying power. No amount of human zeal, earnest endeavour, or organization, can take the place of the Holy Spirit and achieve success in the salvation of souls. These special manifestations of the Holy Spirit can only be brought about by much prayer and waiting upon God. When the Christian people are so fully yielded to God that they can say as Cornelius did when Peter came, "We are all here present before God to hear all things commanded thee of God", then we may expect certain results to follow, as it was at Cornelius' house, when the Holy Spirit fell. Both Jews and Gentiles were mightily convinced that God was there indeed. When God pours out his Spirit in that manner, unbelief and skepticism fade away and mighty conviction grips the hearts of the unsaved.

Of course there is a human service which we must render, that will contribute to the success of a revival. There are some things, we think, which the church must do if they are done; God will not do them for us. And we may think that some of these things are insignificant. Next to the Holy Spirit in a meeting, we think it is important that we have a right temperature in the building where services are being held. If people get drowsy, or sleepy, perhaps the building needs ventilating by a change of air; or if they are in any way uncomfortable, too cold, or too warm, while the evangelist is preaching, it is exceedingly hard to get them to think seriously of their soul needs. It requires a good, smart, wideawake man to make a good janitor for a church. God will not go out and invite people to come church. He has said "Go ye". Neither will he give them a hearty welcome when they do come. We will need to give them a cordial hand-shake and make them feel like coming again. Paul said, "We are workers together with Him". So we have our part to do to make a revival possible, and God will show us what our part is, if we seek to

A genuine God-sent revival will change things. It will change men's hearts and lives; it will change conditions in the town or community where it strikes. We have known men in business to pay old, long-standing accounts; we have known some to confess their dishonesty, and to take back things they had stolen; we have

known some to quit selling intoxicating liquor and tobacco etc., because God had changed their hearts. A genuine revival is always a time of great rejoicing. As was the case when Philip went down to Samaria (he was not called) and preached Christ unto them. A genuine revival such as we need and such as God wants to send us would clean up our political life, and the social life of our country, stop a lot of crime among our young people, and establish Christian homes and set up family altars again. "Oh Lord, wilt Thou not revive us again, that Thy people may rejoice in thee".

God does not reject men because they are sinners, but because they reject Jessus who is the way, the truth and the life.

V. NICODEMUS: John 3-1-2 A ruler of the Jews—A member of the Sanhedrin—Came to Jesus by night—Either to avoid publicity or because evening afforded more time for conversation.
