As you know, Sister Thelma, some years ago, received a definite call to the Lord's work. For years she has been praying, "Lord, show me where I am needed the most."

A holiness friend, well-known to our people, told Sister Thelma about the Holiness Missionary work in the mountains of Kentucky, where the workers are chiefly un-married women, suggesting that, if interested, she write Miss Lela McConnell. Some of us fasted and prayed about the matter and felt good in our souls about it, knowing that our Lord, who supplieth all our needs, would send in the funds.

Can you not see, dear people, that this is a work to which we, in all good faith, would be well-advised to send a missionary? The need is great. The majority of the workers are un-married women. I notice, too, that two of the trustees of this work are prominent men, Dr. Peter Wiseman, Dr. C. W. Butler.

Dear Highway:

Some have made inquiry about my whereabouts since I left our Holiness Bible Institute at its close on the evening of June 13th.

I shall endeavor to give a sketch of my wanderings in this fair land of gracious blessings materially and spiritually. From June 15th to June 29th I spent two weeks at my old home with my father and my brother and his wife. There I received a much needed rest. On June 16th I attended my home church at Meductic and heard my pastor, Rev. H. C. Mullen, preach a very timely message. On June 23rd I attended the Reformed Baptist Churches at Fredericton and Marysville. I preached in the morning service to a fine audience in Rev. H. E. Mullen's church at Fredericton. That evening I heard Rev. F. A. Watson bring a very helpful message at Marysville. On June 30th I supplied at Maple Ridge and Millville. I enjoyed ministering to those fine people.

On July 1st I journeyed to Saugus, Mass. While in Massachusetts I had the privilege of attending the Nazarene Camp Meeting at Reading a few times during the week and also on Sunday. On the morning of July 7th I heard Rev. Byron Maybury preach in his church at West Somerville, Mass.

I had gone to Massachusetts with the thought of taking a Refresher Course at some Summer School. I couldn't get just what I wanted at Boston University. In the meantime I had communicated with Dr. J. A. Huffman, President of Winona Lake School of Theology at Winona Lake, Indiana. I found that they offered just what I wanted in Theology and Biblical Literature.

I enjoyed the beautiful scenery between Boston and Winona. I met some old friends and I trust made many new ones. There was a great deal of hard work connected with the Summer School. The courses were very intensive and the teachers very thorough. Dr. J. A. Huffman is an able Bible Expositor. He is doing a fine piece of work as President of Winona Lake School of Theology. The work is of a high order. People come there from different parts of U. S. A. and Canada. Between eighty and one hundred attended the School this summer. Dr. J. A. Huffman is dean of Theology in Taylor University at Upland,

Indiana. The other members of his faculty in this particular Summer Session were as follows: Dr. Charbonnier of Taylor University; Dr. R. Earle, of the Nazarene Theological Seminary, Kansas, Mo.; Dr. H. B. Kuhn of Asbury Theological Seminary, Asbury, Ky.; and Rev. J. A. Huffman, Jr., of Boston, Mass.

I took five courses. I found that I had plenty to do. I had not attended school since my graduation from college in 1928. I found the courses intensely interesting. I audited one course, wrote a theme paper of three thousand words in another course, and took exams in three other courses. If I ever care to attend a Theological Seminary, I shall have five units toward a B. D. or a Master's degree. I wouldn't want to take a great deal for the practical experience. It was what I needed personally to help my morale. I felt it was what I needed to help my students at our Holiness Bible Institute. It gave us the teacher's view point and also the student's point of view. I met a fine class of people in our faculty and in the student body. The chapel services were times of inspiration. We had access to a fine library. Winona is a beautiful spot. It overlooks a fine lake. The Billy Sunday Tabernacle has a seating capacity of 8,000. They were holding a six-weeks convention with one hundred of the leading preachers of U. S. A. I heard a few of the speakers. We were too busy to get to many of the services.

I was favorably impressed with the people of Indiana. They seemed to be very friendly. They are very much concerned about Religious Education and Evangelism.

While in Indiana I spent one week-end with Rev. and Mrs. E. Adcock and another week-end with Mrs. Melvina Hardy and son Miles at Anderson, Indiana. Mr. Adcock and Mrs. Hardy are employed at the Church of God Publishing House in Anderson. They gave me the privilege of visiting the Publishing House, their Camp Ground, and a class in Summer Session at their College. I attended one of the larger churches of the Church of God people on two occasions and heard two fine messages. I also attended a Nazarene Church in that city and enjoyed the message and fellowship. Mrs. Adcock and Mrs. Hardy are sisters of Leon and Elwood Cogswell, of Fort Fairfield, Me. I was royally entertained in their homes.

On August 3rd I returned to Boston, Mass. On August 4th I heard Rev. T. Smith at Cliftondale and Rev. E. Edwards at Malden Nazarene Churches. On August 5th and 6th my wife and I accompanied Rev. and Mr. H. S. Blaney to the Camp Meeting at Portsmouth, R. I. We enjoyed the ministry of Rev. Berryhill and Dr. L. A. Reed. On August 11th I supplied the pulpit of the Nazarene Church at Cliftondale. It was a joy to minister to those fine people.

I was so sorry to miss Beulah this year. It was the second time that I missed since 1920. Wife and I were privileged to attend Riverside Camp at Robinson, Maine, for the last four days. Our evangelist, E. Edwards, was at his best. I never heard our brethren preach so well. God was with us.

On Sunday, August 25th, I plan to supply the pulpit at Belvidere and Crystal, Maine.

On September 10th, D. V., I plan to be on duty at the Holiness Bible Institute as it opens its second year. Wife and I shall be keeping house in part of Rev. H. L. Robertson's residence at 254 Grover St. in Woodstock, N. B.

Pray that God will give our School and Churches a blessed year.
